Facts and Figures

About AFS

AFS is an international, voluntary, non-governmental, non-profit organization that provides intercultural learning opportunities to help people develop the knowledge, skills and understanding needed to create a more just and peaceful world.

The German organization for youth exchange and intercultural learning is part of the worldwide AFS network with more than 60 equal partners in over 50 countries.

The headquarters and a regional office are located in Hamburg, additional regional offices are situated in Berlin, Wiesbaden and Stuttgart. AFS is an educational organization promoting intercultural competences and global learning through and beyond its exchange programs to improve global understanding. Besides student exchange and host family programs, AFS offers participation in social, cultural and ecological voluntary services as well as intercultural training programs.

About the Kaleidoscope Study

In this study the researchers from the University of Essex monitored approximately 2500 exchange students, all of whom participated in an intercultural exchange program for 10 months. These sojourners travelled to and from around 50 different countries. Measures were recorded at multiple points in time: pre-exchange, during the exchange and post-exchange. The study included substantial samples of German students travelling abroad and international students being hosted in Germany. The findings from these sub-samples will also be presented.

The study focused on several research areas. For cultural adaptation, it examined how the exchange students adapted to living abroad, how this adaptation affected their well-being (e.g. stress and self-esteem), and what the most effective coping mechanisms were. For cultural learning, the researchers looked at whether and how the exchange impacted on different aspects of learning, including bi-cultural knowledge, cross-cultural competence, interpersonal skills, and language proficiency. The third topic, interpersonal & intergroup contact, focused on social identity, interpersonal contact, and whether the exchange was effective in reducing intergroup anxiety. Finally, the influence of cultural distance on different aspects of intercultural travel was considered.
